TRAVELLING BY BUS

Long Road is well served by local bus companies Whippet, Stagecoach and the Guided Bus. The closest bus stops to the college are Robinson Way, Puddicombe Way and Long Road. Addenbrookes Hospital Bus Station is just 10 minutes walk away. Journeys may be direct to college, or could require a change in Cambridge City Centre.

TRAVELLING BY TRAIN

Cambridge Railway Station is currently the closest station to the college approximately 1.5 miles away.

Students can then catch the **FREE Long Road Shuttle Bus** from Cambridge Railway Station to the College.

Alternatively, the walk from Cambridge Railway Station is approximately a 25 minutes or 10 minute cycle.

WEEK IN THE LIFE OF A LONG ROAD STUDENT

Studying at Long Road is different to studying at school. We recognise you as an individual and treat you as an adult. Not all of your learning will be in classrooms; you'll hear lectures and attend workshops led by experts related to your study programme and future goals.

At Long Road you will be taught by highly qualified and experienced subject specialist teachers. Our small class sizes (maximum 24 students) allow for high levels of student participation in mature group discussions, encouraging you to develop and express your opinions.

The college day runs from 9am – 4:10pm, but unlike school you won't spend all day in classes. Independent study periods allow you to work on assignments, carry out research and explore your course in depth outside of the classroom.

You will have 3 lessons per subject per week, meaning you spend just over 14 hours per week in classes.

We recommend 4 hours per subject per week for independent study, totalling 12 hours per week, and an additional 1 hour planning for the week ahead. This adds up to 27 hours, 10 hours short of a working week. If you use your independent study periods wisely you'll be able to keep every evening and weekend free to enjoy!

College life isn't all about academic study; it's a time to meet new people and try out new experiences. Our enrichment activities are a great way for you to explore your passions and get to meet other students outside the classroom. Maybe you've already got a keen interest – or maybe you're looking for a new hobby – either way we're sure to have something that you want to get involved in.





EXTENDED PROJECT QUALIFICATION

Boost your CV and enhance your personal statement while carrying out an independent project on a topic you love. The EPQ is equivalent to half an A Level, but it's so much more than an extra qualification.

The Extended Project Qualification showcases to employers and universities that you're an independent learner, able to manage a project, solve problems, organise your time, conduct original research and produce a high-quality product.

Independence is key with the EPQ, meaning you get to choose what you'd like to study and how you'd like to study it. The topic can be related to your other subjects or can be something completely different, allowing you to explore your other passions.

You can decide how you present your final product. You can...

- write a dissertation
- create an artefact
- produce a performance
- carry out an investigation.

If you decide to carry out the EPQ you'll start at the end of Year 1 of your Level 3 course, giving you time to think about your goals after Long Road and tailor your EPQ to help achieve these dreams.

Although the EPQ is largely independent study, you'll have a specialised EPQ tutor to keep you on track and regular lessons to help you to understand the requirements of the qualification.

WHY SHOULD I STUDY EPQ?

Depending on the grade you achieve you can gain up to 28 additional UCAS points!

Universities look at EPQ as an excellent way for students to prepare for degree level study. It demonstrates your dedication to independent learning. In fact, it's so highly valued that some universities will lower their grade boundaries if you achieve a high EPQ grade!

After our hike down the Volcano on day two our students had earnt some relaxation time! We spent some free time exploring the volcanic black sand beaches, swimming in the warm waters of the Mediterranean and treating ourselves to some arancini and granita (a local iced slush drink). After a fantastic day, we boarded the hydrofoil ferry again and headed back to mainland Sicily, where after an eventful journey we made it back to the hotel and some tasty pasta dinner.



GEOGRAPHERS START YEAR WITH TRIP TO SICILY!

This September, 29 of our Year 2 Geography students kickstarted the academic year with a trip to Sicily! We had an incredible experience throughout the trip, seeing multiple volcanoes up close, experiencing Sicilian culture and food, sampling local honey, exploring old lava flows as well as enjoying a bit of beach relaxation time!

On our first day after a very early morning we arrived at Catania airport in Sicily, where we met our coach and drove straight to the Alcantara Gorge, Botanic and Geological Park. This incredible site featured towering basalt columns which formed when lava rapidly cooled in contact with cold water. A river has since

cut its way down through weaknesses in the basalt to form a gorge, with waterfalls and incredible views. This was a lovely place to cool off and explore after a long journey. It was then back on the coach and off to our hotel in Letojanni, which was right on the beach, for some dinner and a well needed early night.

Our second day was particularly volcanic, and after an early start we arrived as Messina Port, where we boarded a very speedy hydrofoil ferry to the island of Vulcano, just off the coast of Sicily. This incredible island is dominated by a major volcano (Vulcano), after which all other volcanoes in the world are named! Vulcano last erupted in the 1890s, and is

Luckily for us, conditions were perfect and the weather was excellent, and we met our local guide who took us on a guided hike to the very top of the volcano, with a panoramic view of the stunning surrounding islands and the crater of the volcano. From the top, we could see most of the Aeolian islands in the distance, including Stromboli volcano, which was in the process of erupting! and some tasty pasta dinner.

The next day was Mount Etna day – something we had all been greatly looking forward to! With a trusty guide taking us around the summit of the volcano, we saw some incredible landscapes which were very stark and barren, and walked on freshly created, 10-day old ground. We saw lava bombs from the recent eruption,

still warm, collected rock samples and saw some truly unforgettable sights.

Finally, our last day in Sicily had come, and unfortunately we had to adapt our plans on this day, as the first BIG rain of the season hit Sicily after a very dry summer, with the most torrential rain we have ever seen pouring down across the island for around 5 hours. We made it to Taormina, a beautiful historic town which houses an incredible ancient Greek / Roman amphitheatre

Despite the rain on the last day, we had an excellent trip. We have many incredible memories of the trip, and lots of extra tectonics knowledge now! Now to plan our next trip...

WE SAVED THE TIGER BUS PASS!

On Thursday 18th of December, Charlotte Smith, Social Action & Enrichment Coordinator, along with four students: Safa Darr, Jeffrey Asomani, Amna Rushdhi, and Ryan Nyazamba, attended the Cambridge and Peterborough Combined Authority Board Meeting to secure another year of funding for the Tiger Pass, which will be extended until March 2027.

Before the board meeting began, Ryan presented Mayor Paul Bristow with a Tiger teddy which sat at his desk for the duration of the board meeting. Additionally, Jeffrey gave him a copy of the report on why the Tiger Pass is important to young people, which included testimonies

from young people interviewed across Cambridgeshire and Peterborough, as well as an open letter to the mayor supported by a variety of educational leaders and allies, including Steve Dann. Finally, Safa asked Paul if he would come to Long Road in the new year to talk to students about the Tiger Pass, which he happily committed to.

This is a brilliant example of how students at Long Road Sixth Form College can be involved with broad-based organising and can campaign for something in their personal interest and have a county-wide impact.



STUDENTS GET SNEAK PEEK OF CAMBRIDGE FILM FESTIVAL 2025
