
If you haven't got one already, download a news app to your phone. To study Criminology properly you must be aware of the news in regards to crime and be able to use your knowledge of contemporary news examples in your work and class discussions. We recommend the Guardian news app (scan the QR code or search online) where there is a Crime section, or the BBC app.





There are plenty of programmes on TV that are linked to crime, but try and watch the ones that are more connected to real life e.g. 24 hours in Police Custody (scan the QR code or search online). You will find the course more interactive if you have watched these programmes, and have an idea about what's going on in in society with regard to crime and justice today.

There are also several content creators on YouTube and Tik Tok who discuss true crime cases. You can even follow #TrueCrime on Tik Tok (scan the QR code or search online). Popular YouTube hosts such as Eleanor Neale also discuss True Crime cases which you may find interesting.
